SMART stands for Self Management and Recovery Training. We want to thank Third Haven for supporting our efforts to help people with compulsive behavior problems like drugs, alcohol, gambling, overeating, sexual behavior and other behaviors. By allowing us to use the Common Room for our weekly meetings on Wednesdays you have touched many lives and families. We offer the SMART meeting for people choosing recovery as well as a Family and Friends support group. We emphasize the power of choice by teaching cognitive behavioral tools that help people choose rational behaviors that are in their long-term best interests. This applies to overcoming drug and alcohol problems as well as to everyday relationships and decisions. Our 4 point program covers maintaining motivation to abstain, coping with urges, managing thoughts feelings and behaviors, and life style balance. SMART people attend until they have accomplished their goals and then leave us for happier, healthier lives. Thank you for helping SMART help our community.

Third Haven Friends Meeting 2017 State of the Meeting Report

THMM continues as a vibrant community. This year we added three new members, lost three well-loved members, and received two membership transfers, bringing THMM total membership to 162. Meetings for worship offer strong spiritual nurture, and weekly attendance is stable (40-65/First Day). Our historical significance and rich spiritual life continue to draw Quaker visitors as well as seekers from many places and backgrounds.

The Meeting is strong financially, with adequate reserves, and finished the fiscal year with a healthy surplus. TH committees continued to function well, enabling us to fulfill the work we are called to do.

Ongoing programs include:

- Spring and Fall Clean Up Days

One of the more visible projects this year was a "functional update" of the Common Room, built in 1983. Highlights include sound control in the main room, conversion of lighting to LED, and updating the kitchen. The result is a more useable and attractive space that should serve us for many years to come.

In addition to ongoing programs, we had several special events this year.

January: 25 members participated in a Clerking Workshop with Arthur Larrabee.

February-March: Worship & Ministry held ongoing sessions discussing revisions in Faith and Practice

February: THMM hosted the Friends General Conference nominating Committee Annual retreat.

March: Marcelle Martin spoke to us kicking off our nine month Spiritual Formation Group in which 18 members and attenders of THMM participated.

March: Property & Grounds began work on boundary restoration clearing of overgrown vegetation with environmentally sound land and stream work.

Summer: Outreach held a series of Family Fun Nights at a local park for the community at large. First Day School placed a tire swing in our old magnolia.

September: Revised the Facilities Use Policies for clarity and consistency.
Outreach and Overseers family picnic.

October: Scholarship awarded grants to nine of our Quaker students throughout the year.

November: The Shoffner Education Fund continues to support Susana Ramirez's medical school education in Bolivia for the 5th year. We approved an increase in our annual charitable giving and sent checks to 13 different organizations. Testimonies & Concerns helped us pass a minute to stand for Nuclear Disarmament that we forwarded to FCNL. Over 200 trees planted!

December: The Easton Christmas parade Peace float held Third Haven members and attenders. We have finished out our year by holding our Christmas Eve Day worship in our 333 and 1/3 year-old meeting house (with no heat) complete with a wonderful First Day program and a hot and hearty luncheon. This was a perfect way for us to appreciate our blessing especially that of our community of THMM.

Discussion: A member noted that Philadelphia Yearly Meeting is encouraging the state of the meeting report evaluate the spiritual health of the meeting. Many committees and member efforts support these activities. The Meeting is much more active than it was ten years ago.



Overseers Annual Report – Dona Sorce presented by Nancy Robbins-Accepted

The 2017 Overseers Committee included the following members: Larny Claggett, Lorraine Claggett, Marsie Hawkinson, Connie Lewis, Nancy Robbins, Adrienne Rudge, Dona Sorce (Clerk). These same members will continue to serve in 2018 and the following members will be joining the committee in 2018: Dawn Atwater, Tom Corl, and Bill Schauer. Nancy Robbins serves as Co – Clerk with Dona Sorce.

In 2017, Overseers met on the last Sunday of each month during the months of January, February, March, April, May, August, September, October, and November. The December meeting was held on January 7th due to holiday plans.

The primary focus of monthly committee meetings was the sharing of concerns for individual members and discussion regarding how Overseers might reach out to offer support and expressions of care.

During the year, Overseers members reached out to individual members with phone calls, cards, and home, hospital, and nursing home visits.

Two meetings for clearness were held for new membership requests from Dolores and Bob Wack and Connie Crow. Three clearness meetings were held for reasons other than membership or marriage.

Overseers assisted the Zeigler family with planning the memorial service for Frank Zeigler on July 16th. Overseers members, primarily Larny Claggett, assisted families of other members who died during the year with making arrangements for memorial plaques to be placed on the wall in the churchyard.

Overseers organized and/or assisted with efforts for the following membership activities in 2017:

- The New Members and Attenders Lunch on March 5th that was well-attended and supported by the membership at large.
- The annual Fall Community Picnic on September 17th.
- The annual Holiday celebration on December 24th.
- The Friendly 8s gathering that will take place in the Winter of 2018.
- The purchase, creation, and distribution of new name tags for members.
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Overseers began planning the program for the May 20th, 2018 Southern Quarter Meeting. The topic of this program is developing Care Teams for members and attenders who are unable to attend Meeting for Worship due to prolonged illness, disability or end of life issues.

The Monthly Meeting of Friends of Philadelphia reminds us that the John Martin Trust provides financial grant support to members of the Philadelphia Yearly Meeting and its affiliated Monthly Meetings for “necessitous Friends.” Typically these are elderly persons on a fixed income or families with expenses beyond their means created by illness, accident or long term care. Grant limits per 6 month term are \$7500. Ongoing assistance or loans may also be given. Requests from 3rd Haven members in need can be made to the Overseers Committee. The Clerk of the meeting commented that Overseers were a big help with the Mufson funeral and continue to support the family. The John Martin Trust financial aid has been used in the past to help our members.

2nd Quarter Treasurers Report – Cynthia Quast-Accepted

For the first half of our 2017/18 fiscal year we have the following results:

Our member contributions total just over \$25,200 which is almost 50% of our annual Member contributions budget. Our Attender contributions total \$4,800 giving us 87% of our Attender contributions budget. Our total income totals over \$39,000 which is 63% of our total income budget. Our ordinary expenses total almost \$35,000 which is about 56% of our expense budget. This gives us a net ordinary income year-to-date of just over \$4,100. Our Common Room Remodel expenses total about \$4,300 which brings our Net Income to minus \$168.

On Balance Sheet as of 12/31/17, we had over \$41,300 in our operating checking account and over \$64,000 in our Invested operating funds at Friends Fiduciary.

In comparing the first half of this fiscal year to the prior year, our Member contributions are down by over \$1,200 and our total income is up by over \$5,000 and our ordinary

expenses are down about \$5,000 higher giving us a net ordinary income about equal to last year.

As of Dec. 31st, 50% through fiscal year things are looking up. See spreadsheets on website for details.

There are several classes relevant to the Vision, Mission and Approach of Coming to the Table. A few examples: In Session 1, classes include Forgiveness & Reconciliation and Modern Slavery and the Prison-Industrial Complex. Session 2 classes include Restorative Justice and Circle Process. Session 3 includes STAR, Level I (Strategies for Trauma Awareness & Resilience; so-facilitated by CTTT member Donna Minter) and Truth-telling, Racial Healing and Restorative Justice (co-facilitated by CTTT Board President

Jodie Geddes). Session 4 takes place at the same time as the 2018 CTTT National Gathering.
