**Southern Quarterly Meeting Report**, Larissa Kitenko: January 18, 2015

"Friends representing all four Meetings in Southern Quarter plus from the Lewes Worship group convened at Cadbury at Lewes on January 18th.

Meeting for Worship was held at 10:00 a.m. followed by Meeting for Business and a luncheon. Three Friends were present from Wicomico River Meeting, three from Chester River, six from Cadbury, twenty from Camden and five from Third Haven. Each Meeting presented their Annual Report. Once Billingsley of Camden Meeting, a member of the FCNL Board and has been appointed to the "Visiting Friends Program". He would be glad to visit Meetings to speak about their work.

Christie Duncan-Tesmer, PYM's new General Secretary was also present. Christie talked about the long range message of PYM which is "We are us. We are the Yearly Meeting - All Of Us!". She shared the four main endeavors of PYM:

**1. From our center:**

We live from our center, our Quaker values. Living in this manner informs and guides our entire lives.

**2. How does the truth fare with thee?:**

Quakers are careful with their words. In former times, they wanted to know about each others' spiritual condition and relationship with the Divine. They would greet each other with phrases like "How does the spirit live in thee?" "Has truth favored thee?" She urged us to try this approach and observe the difference in the encounter as opposed to "Hi, how are you?" said in passing. She developed a collection of cards with a variety of phrases for greeting that would appeal to all, e.g., "Are you being truthful to yourself?"; "What gives you joy?" and "Is your heart free?" Additional queries are attached.

**3. Intervisitation:**

Friends in Philadelphia Yearly Meeting are invited to visit two meetings each year as a way to know one another better and experience the breadth and diversity of our faith community. They are also invited to share a snapshot report of their experience on the PYM website as a record of the travel amongst ourselves.

**4. Quaker Life Stories:**

Friends have an impact on this world. Let people know you are a Quaker and share your story about your spiritual or temporal journey. Stories can be posted on the website. "

The Committee also had a large durable banner made that can be used at festivals and events to identify Quakers from Third Havens Friends Meeting. The banner will be kept in the Common Room. Several other initiatives were shared and the Committee Clerk shared goals for the year ahead.

#### **Charitable Contributions Committee – Brian Shean**

"THFM Charitable Contributions Committee Report to meeting for business  
Second Month, 8<sup>th</sup>, 2015

The committee met three times in January. Since much progress has been made discussing our giving process, we wanted to share our thoughts with Meeting at this point and welcome your questions and feedback.

First and foremost, we wanted to come up with a "process" or guidelines that were simple, easy to understand, responsible and replicable each year. After much discernment and realization that the needs in our world are great, we decided on a simple

way to divide our donations. We suggest dividing our donations in half, giving one half to Quaker organizations and one half to local organizations. We define ‘local’ as the Mid-Shore area. This addresses the Quaker organizations many of us think are important and many of the local ones our Meeting members and attenders volunteer with. We discussed whether or not to give a large amount to one or two charities or to give less to more charities. We recommend that we give only to 5 -7 Quaker groups each year and 5-7 local groups each year. This allows us to do a better job of overseeing the work of these groups and still gives to a fair number of groups that we at THFM have consistently felt are important and meaningful.

With this basic structure in mind, we discussed what would be of importance in choosing each charity. The most important quality in choosing a charity to give to is to easily understand the value and Quaker testimony they are trying to fulfill in their mission. Each person on our committee took two charities to review; one Quaker and one local. We had the task of investigating the mission of the charity, what testimony and value they represent and how well they are doing their job both in outreach and financial stewardship. In a roundtable format, we discussed all these institutions separately. We have made a chart of these groups. The Quaker organizational chart is included in this report. We are not completely through the charting of our local organizations. This simple charting system will be available in the Common Room throughout the year and updated at the end of the year. We hope to highlight a charity each month in our newsletter and perhaps conduct programs in FDS or after rise of meeting for some of our chosen charities. Each year, we will review our groups and make a new list of recommendations. We believe flexibility as well as Meeting input in this process is important. Depending on how this first year goes, we hope to rotate at least one charity off the chart each year and put a new one in its place. This will insure that we “spread the wealth” and continue a learning process for our Meeting.

Each year we will discuss our potential charities in January, present our initial recommendations in February or March and be able to approve the final list no later than April each year. This gives our Meeting time to consider our selection.

As always, we welcome any input from others. We respectfully request that if you have a charity you would like for us to consider, please contact one of our members in order to understand the information that needs to be given to us in order to discuss a group. We would like information regarding the group’s mission, a bit of their history and current organizational structure, information regarding their financial situation and a reason why we should give to them. Our next committee meeting will be held on Feb 23<sup>rd</sup> at 4:30 PM in the Common Room.

## **Pendle Hill conference: Ending Mass Incarceration and the New Jim Crow**


April 29 - May 3, 2015 at Pendle Hill is a conference for inspiration, education, networking, and action.

### **Keynote speaker: Author and Professor Michelle Alexander**

The United States imprisons 2.4 million men, women, and children—one out of every 100 Americans. The U.S. has largest prison population in the world, both in total numbers and as a percentage of its population. With only five per cent of the world's population, the United States accounts for nearly a quarter of all prisoners in the world.

These alarming incarceration rates disproportionately affect people of color. Representing only 30 per cent of our population, people of color comprise almost 60 per cent of those imprisoned. One in 15 African American men and one in 36 Hispanic men is incarcerated, and one out of every three African American men in this country can expect to go to prison at some point during his lifetime.
